State Standards in the Fine Arts

GOAL 25: Know the language of the arts.

Why This Goal Is Important: Through observation, discussion, interpretation and analysis, students learn the “language” of the arts. They learn to understand how others express ideas in dance, drama, music and visual art forms. In addition to acquiring knowledge essential to performance and production, students become arts consumers (e.g., attending live performances or movies, purchasing paintings or jewelry, or visiting museums) who understand the basic elements and principles underlying artworks and are able to critique them.

GOAL 26: Through creating and performing, understand how works of art are produced.

Why This Goal Is Important: Students acquire skills to produce and perform dance, drama, music and visual art. They learn to use media, tools and technologies. They learn to shape ideas and emotions into sounds, images and actions. As students create and perform their own artworks and review the works of others, they become more imaginative, strengthen their problem-solving skills and learn to respond to the creativity of others. Creating and performing are at the core of the fine arts. Students also learn about the role of the artist (e.g., dancer, painter, actor, director, scriptwriter, musician).

GOAL 27: Understand the role of the arts in civilizations, past and present.

Why This Goal Is Important: The arts are a record of civilizations, past and present. Artists are influenced by—and influence—the times and places in which they live and work. As students learn through the arts about people and civilizations, they learn about others and themselves. Also, students learn about careers related to this goal (e.g., animator, curator, art historian, sound technician).

BEFORE THE SHOW

Learning Activities

- **MAKE A SPACE IN YOUR CLASSROOM TO FEATURE URBAN GATEWAYS ARTISTS!**

- Bulletin board
- Special corner

- **SPARK CONVERSATIONS BY ASKING QUESTIONS ABOUT THE UPCOMING PERFORMANCE!**

- Generate a list of questions with your students about the art form.
- Initiate conversations about the upcoming performance:

Example: Your school has invited a Tap Dance Group to perform for your students. Before they arrive, ask your students:

- Have you ever heard of the Tap style of dance?
- What do you know about Tap dance?
- From which country did Tap dance originate?
- How long has Tap existed as a dance form?
- Why do you think people tap dance?
- What are the differences between Tap Dance and other kinds of dance?
- What kinds of training and experience do you need to tap dance?
- What kind of music do you think goes with tap dance?
- What kinds of costumes do you think the dancers will wear?
- How do you learn tap dance?

- **ENTICE STUDENTS WITH RELATED ARTWORK SAMPLES!**

- Share an audio recording or relevant clip
- Show a relevant painting, photo or image
- Read about the history and context of the art form
- Research samples of related work/genre online

- **INTRODUCE and EXPLORE ARTISTS' VOCABULARY: (*See to artist bio insert*)**

- Make a special "Word Wall" of UG artist language: (for example)
 - Lighting
 - Blocking
 - Sound design
 - Scenery
 - Props
 - Pacing
 - Script
 - Costumes
 - Dialogue
 - Collaboration
- Identify Artistic Production Roles
 - Playwright or author
 - Composer
 - Director
 - Technical director
 - Choreographer
 - Cast/Ensemble
- Create Flash Cards and Study Words
- Discuss the History of a Single Term
- Learn the Etymology of an Artist's Terms

- **MAKE SOCIAL STUDIES/LANGUAGE ARTS CURRICULAR CONNECTIONS:**
 - Link the world map with pictures of the artist or artist's culture next to the relevant region or country
 - Connect social studies class activities to the upcoming performance
 - Assign student presentations related to the culture or history of the upcoming show
 - Explore related literature and writers associated with art form

- **REVIEW AUDIENCE ETTIQUETTE BEFORE SEEING THE SHOW (See “At The Show”)**
 - Discuss the “art” of reactions
 - Practice appropriate behavior for showing appreciation
 - Talk about the value of forming your own opinion about the show
 - Encourage students to stay focused and engaged

- **INITIATE STUDENT-LED RESEARCH**
 - Research the artist group by visiting the artist's website
 - View related links recommended by artist (see Artist Information Sheet)

AT THE SHOW

Being in the Moment

Students who attend Urban Gateways performances are the audiences and artists of tomorrow. **Preparing students** makes the show both more **meaningful and enjoyable**.

JUST BEFORE THE PERFORMANCE

Allow plenty of time to get settled and use the washroom if needed before the performance begins. During the performance, please have an adult escort any child needing to use the washrooms. Large groups of students leaving for the washrooms are very distracting to other audience members as well as to the performers.

APPROPRIATE RESPONSES TO THE SHOW

Live performers LOVE to hear student responses! Behaviors that show respect and appreciation vary from culture to culture. Typically, they include: laughter, clapping, cheering (such as using the words 'Bravo' and 'Encore') and following directions of the performers.



INAPPROPRIATE RESPONSES TO THE SHOW

- Talking, eating, whispering, and poking can distract hundreds of people. **If these disruptions occur, handle them quietly. We urge you to deal with the disruption immediately but in a way that does not disturb others.**
- Use of cameras or tape recorders during the performance is strictly forbidden. **The use of cameras with flash attachments distracts and endangers performers. It is important for students to understand that this restriction is universal in theaters all over the world.**

AFTER THE PERFORMANCE

Please take time to fill out the touring performance Teacher Observation Survey and Student Surveys mail them back to Urban Gateways after the performance. This information helps Urban Gateways in program planning and improvement.

AFTER THE SHOW

Extending the Learning

After the performance has ended, there are many ways to continue the learning. Here are just a few examples:

INITIATE REFLECTIVE DIALOGUE:

- Close your eyes. What image or moment from the performance comes to mind?
- Why do you think this performance was created?
- How many people were involved in the creation of this performance?
- What are the different roles needed to create this performance?
- What does this performance communicate and/or express to you?
- What did you think about the way...?
- What did you notice about ...?
- What was your favorite moment?
- What would you do differently?
- What aspect of the performance would you like to experience again?
- How would you explain this performance to others?
- How did the performance make you feel?
- What aspect of the performance would you like to participate in next time?
- How did the performance connect with our study of _____?

REVIEW ARTIST VOCABULARY (*See artist bio*)

WRITE ABOUT IT!

- Ask students to write and/or sketch in journals about the performance. These journals can be shared in pairs, small groups or school-wide.
- Keep a “community journal” – everyone adds a line or thought.
- Ask students to write a “review” of the performance.
- Generate questions from your students about the experience.



WRITE TO THE ARTIST:

- **Artists love to hear from their audience!** Ask the students to write thank-you letters to the artists. Send all letters to:
